Thoughts for the coming week.... Sundays not included in the  $40~\mathrm{days}$ 

- Clean up a common area at work, in the neighbourhood, or at home. Do it as your gift for the good of all / pray for those who keep our environment tidy or empty our wastebins
- Look at the birds flying around us, and consider our part in the diversity of creation
- Speak less and listen more. Give others the gift of your undivided attention.
- Pray for the children and young people living near you and their families
- Fast from overscheduling your time. Leave some time to simply be to think on God's impact in your life
- Think of three words that describe God for you, that you could share



Today, the traditions of years gone by come together as we celebrate **Laetare Sunday**, the 4th Sunday in Lent; so called from the first word "Rejoice" of the introit of the liturgy.

It is also known as **Refreshment Sunday** because it may be observed with some relaxation of Lenten strictness.

It is traditional to use Rose vestments to mark this relaxation from the Austerity of purple and enhance the time of rejoicing.

Mothering Sunday grew out of this, when children were allowed their only day off in the year, to return to their mothers from their work as servants and from this, the church developed the tradition of celebrating in their mother church—their Cathedral. Posies were given and simnel cakes were often made and consumed on this day. For all of us it is a chance to give thanks for those who have nurtured us in our lives and to reflect and rejoice in the cherishing nature of God, whom

Julian of Norwich refers to as 'God, mother and father of us all' Words from St Anselm in 1033.....

Jesus, like a mother you gather your people to you; you are gentle with us as a mother with her children. Often you weep over our sins and our pride, tenderly you draw us from hatred and judgement. You comfort us in sorrow and bind up our wounds.

#### DIOCESAN LENT BOOK.

Bishop David has chosen the book 'Healing Wounds' by Erik Varden

Are we healed through our wounds or are our wounds themselves healed from some other source? HEALING WOUNDS In this 2025 Lent Book, Erik Varden starts by examining the New Testament where it spells out why Christ's wounds were efficacious for the healing of humankind. He contends that while this theological perspective is

fundamental, it often falls short of addressing the emotional and spiritual needs of believers. Bob Dylan once said, tongue in cheek, 'Pain sure does bring out the best in people.' The philosopher Donald MacKinnon said, 'Suffering never ennobled anyone.' Suffering by nature poses questions people wrestle with today in many fields of life with counsellors, therapists, philosophers, and spiritual directors. But the conundrum remains and in this book Varden sets out to resolve it. Structured to guide readers through a journey of reflection, beginning with the raw reality of suffering and moving toward the possibility of redemption and renewal. Varden employs a contemplative tone, inviting readers to sit with their own experiences of pain and consider how these might be transformed through faith and introspection. His insights are particularly relevant during the Lenten season, a time of reflection on Christ's passion and its implications for believers.

The book can be obtained through any bookseller, but is currently available on Amazon for £11.95. We will read it individually through Lent, THEN GATHER WITH BISHOP DAVID IN THE CATHEDRAL ON TUESDAY APRIL 15TH AT 10.30<sub>AM</sub> to reflect together on all that it has stirred in us.

heal our hearts of all that prevents us responding to our sisters and brothers excluded by poverty and prevented from living a full and healthy life.


This Lent, may we: implore justice through our prayer,

We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.






Liturgy of the Sacrament **Eucharistic Prayer**

The Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church, the Most Rev Mark Strange, has joined faith leaders across the UK in sending an open letter to call for bold action on child poverty.

The letter has been sent to Liz Kendall and Bridget Philipson, the Secretaries of State for Works and Pensions, and Education and reads: "We write to you as faith leaders from communities across the UK, to encourage you to be bold and ambitious in your upcoming Child Poverty Strategy. We welcome the government's acknowledgement in its manifesto that the UK's increasing levels of child poverty and reliance on emergency food are a "moral scar" on our nation. Without action this scar will deepen, with an additional 400,000 children set to be pulled into poverty over the next decade."

Commenting, Bishop Mark said: "This letter comes from a place of hope. Hope that the call for action on child poverty be heeded by those in power, and that our representatives take the time to listen and learn from those most affected.

"Across the Scottish Episcopal Church there are congregations large and small who are doing their part in their local communities to target poverty. From hosting food banks, clothing banks, and breakfast clubs, to offering warm spaces in cold weather, or simply a place to be welcomed on Sundays or during the week.

"This is part of our call to minister, and as people of hope, we are always seeking to do more. This letter calls on our leaders to do the same - to seek to do more to support those whose lives are made that much more difficult due to the grinding effects of poverty."
